This definitive record sets out the essential features and characteristics of the MSc Advanced Clinical Practice course. This course is a progression route for students who have successfully completed the PgD in Advanced Healthcare Practice or Enhanced Clinical Practice (ACP exit award) and wish to continue their academic study. The information provided is accurate for students entering level 7 in the 2024-25 academic year⁵.

Course Summary

This programme of study has been designed to facilitate students in the development and evidencing of the knowledge, skills and competencies required to work at an advanced level within their own professional setting and role.

Students will be supported to develop a critical awareness of current problems and new insights at the forefront of their professional practice. Students will examine care development and delivery from their own professional standpoint and also take account of how other disciplines challenge and contribute to the quality of care delivery.

This course provides the opportunity for students to engage in a critical exploration of the Advanced Practice agenda in healthcare practice with particular emphasis on leadership coupled with modules designed to facilitate knowledge and skills in relation to assessment/examination skills, clinical reasoning and decision-making, Non-Medical Prescribing module which should be considered core unless the student has already completed the Prescribing qualification or works in a profession where Non-Medical Prescribing is not supported, and Research Methods. The student will then complete the dissertation module, and Leading change in Clinical Practice, which are mandatory for those wishing to complete studies towards the MSc Advanced Healthcare Practice.

Course Aims

- To enable students to engage in critical debate of issues pertinent to the roles and responsibilities within advanced professional practice and respond to them appropriately
- To develop practitioners who are able to work in a professionally autonomous way demonstrating leadership within their area of practice and who are accountable for their own professional and clinical decisions
- To enable students to critically evaluate personal and professional development needs in relation to advanced professional practice and implement appropriate responses
- To enable students to meet the challenges of undertaking research at master's level within their field of practice
- To develop an individual who is able to act as a role model and an educator to initiate change and management development opportunities within the clinical setting

Course Learning Outcomes

The following statements define what students graduating from the MSc Advanced Clinical Practice course will have been judged to have demonstrated in order to achieve the award. Awards

On successful completion of the course, students will be awarded a MSc Advanced Clinical Practice.

Course Delivery

The course is delivered at Ipswich. During this course students studying part-time on the MSc Advanced Clinical Practice are likely to have approximately 30 tutor structured learning hours in the Leading Change in Advanced Practice module. Throughout the dissertation, 20 hours of individual supervision will be available to students. Tutor structured learning will be a mix of lectures, seminars and practical activity. Students will be expected to undertake approximately 20 hours of independent study in a week but should be prepared for this to vary based on assignment deadlines and class exercises.
