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Course Summary

The BA (Hons) English course offers an interdisciplinary approach to the study of literature. linguistics, and creative writing. Students engage with contemporary subjects in literary studies, such as young adult fiction, autobiography, and adaptation. The course allows students to create bespoke personal learning pathways in creative writing and linguistics. The creative writing pathway is founded on the power of the spoken and written word to transform individual lives and perspectives. Students are involved in the practice of reading, researching and writing, and have the opportunity to create a portfolio of published work, including poems, short stories, flash fiction, and novellas. In the linguistics pathway students engage in cuttingedge research in linguistics, exploring topics such as language acquisition and disorders, and variation in spoken language. The pathway allows students to practise key skills in sociolinguistics, conversation analysis, psycholinguistics and literary linguistics. The course is delivered by highly qualified lecturers and practitioners. As well as academic and creative skills, students gain valuable work experience and professional recognition through established course partnerships with local schools, arts organisations, publishers, and regional theatres, and have the opportunity to enter exclusive writing competitions. Students develop core critical and creative capacities that are essential to succeed in a diverse and rapidly changing global environment.

Course Aims

The following aims describe what we aim to provide on the course and what a graduate of the BA (Hons) English at the University of Suffolk should know and be able to do.

The aims of the BA (Hons) English are to:

- Inspire enthusiasm for English and an appreciation of its past and continuing social, cultural, political and economic importance
- Provide an intellectually stimulating experience of learning and studying, and opportunities for interdisciplinary and contextual approaches
- Encourage students to reflect critically upon the acts of reading and writing and on the history of textual production and reception
- Enable students to adopt a wide range of reading strategies, applied to their own work and the work of others
- Support students in the development of their own writing, and develop their confidence through a critical, technical and creative understanding of the subject/craft/art and of their own creative process
- Foster openness of mind, conceptual sophistication in argument and the ability to engage critically with a range of cultural forms and values
- Provide a basis for further study in English or related subjects and for the teaching of English at all levels
- Develop a range of subject-specific and generic skills of value in graduate employment, including high-order critical, analytic and research skills, and advanced competence in oral and written communication.

Optional modules available in any year will be communicated to you prior to your enrolment to facilitate module choice. Some optional modules may not run in every year of study, and the availability of optional modules depends on the level of student demand, the availability of specialist staff and timetabling constraints. In addition, we regularly review our curriculum to ensure it is up-to-date, relevant, draws on the latest research and addresses contemporary issues. As a result, the modules we offer may change over the course of your degree.

Students selecting a combination of creative writing and linguistics modules beyond Level 4, will be awarded a BA (Hons) English. Students will be awarded BA (Hons) English: Literature and Creative Writing where they select only the creative writing modules beyond Level 4, and students will be awarded BA (Hons) English: Literature and Linguistics where they select only the linguistics modules beyond Level 4.

Please note that the Professional Practice (Education/Professional Writing) module may require a DBS check depending on the setting.

Awards

On successful completion of the course, students will be awarded:

- BA (Hons) English with 360 credits, including all mandatory modules from that pathway;
- BA (Hons) English: Literature and Creative Writing with 360 credits including all mandatory modules from that pathway
- BA (Hons) English: Literature and Linguistics with 360 credits including all mandatory modules from that pathway

Students who leave the course early may be eligible for:

- DipHE English on successful completion of 240 credits including all mandatory modules at level 5:
- DipHE English: Literature and Creative Writing on successful completion of 240 credits including all mandatory modules at level 5 in the Literature and Creative Writing pathway;

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- DipHE English: Literature and Linguistics on successful completion of 240 credits including all mandatory modules at level 5 in the Literature and Linguistics pathway;
- CertHE English on successful completion of 120 credits.

Course Delivery

The course is delivered at Ipswich. Students studying full-time on BA (Hons) English are likely to have between 10 and 12 hours of tutor structured learning per week (plus tutorial appointments). Tutor structured learning will be a mix of seminar, workshop, group work, practical activity, online tasks and guided learning activities through our online learning environment. Students will be expected to undertake more independent study as they progress through their degree.

Course Assessment

A variety of assessments will be used on the course to enable students to experience and adapt to different assessment styles. The assessment methods used will be appropriate to assess each module's intended learning outcomes. Assessment on the course overall will be 100% coursework (including critical essays, presentations, annotated bibliographies, creative writing tasks, reflective journals, research papers and independent projects).

Course Team

The academic staff delivering this course are drawn from a team that includes teaching specialists and current practitioners. All staff are qualified in their subjects with their own specialist knowledge to contribute.

Students undertaking the BA (Hons) English will be charged tuition fees as detailed below.
