BA (Hons) Literary Studies with Creative Writing (LMDLCW/LLCWSGLE22)

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Course Summary

This BA (Hons) Literary Studies with Creative Writing degree is designed to encompass the art and craft of writing in a variety of forms, leading to a wide range of expressive and communicative career possibilities. Students will develop a wide range of writing skills across creative and non-fiction genres, different formats and contexts. Opportunities to practice and refine skills will include writing workshops, writing for digital and social media formats, real projects and in-house publications, pitches, curatorial and exhibition writing, reviews and articles. Students will also build a professional portfolio and work on real-life industry projects, giving vital employment experience to prepare for a career in writing.

The BA (Hons) Literary Studies with Creative Writing degree offers a stimulating and wide-ranging introduction to English literature and creative writing. Students will have the opportunity to study and interpret literature from different historical periods and diverse cultural settings and to develop writing skills in several genres including fiction; poetry and life writing. This will develop a wide range of sophisticated reading and writing skills across literary, creative and non-fiction genres, different formats and contexts. Students will study vital and influential works of literature, reading and discussing contemporary works as well as classics in a wide range of genres. The creative writing modules will develop an understanding of the techniques used and challenges faced by the writers studied within the English literature modules. This will also assist in finding inspiration, rooting the students' creative work in the authors and literary traditions that are the subject of that study.

Course Aims

In providing this course, the University and the course team aim to:

- To support a learning experience enabling fulfilment of individual potential through the development of critical, analytical, evaluative and reflective characteristics
- To facilitate the development of practical writing skills in pursuit of creative and commercial targets and objectives
- To encourage, support and develop academic skills enabling achievement of undergraduate skills, including management of a research project
- To enable the development of the personal and professional attributes required for successful employment or further study at post-graduate level
- To encourage in the student significant personal engagement with subject matter and contemporary practices based on personal exploration, intellectual curiosity, reflective practice, and critical judgements
- To develop an appreciation of the diversity of manifestations of the written word and encourage exploration of the mechanics, procedures and applications required for successful creative and commercial writing
- To foster a critical understanding of literary conventions and encourage experimentation

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- To encourage and develop a spirit of self-motivation, collaboration, self-management, and willingness/ability to plan for the future
- To develop an awareness of the importance of the writer in shaping societal and cultural thought through both fiction and non-fiction works
- Develop students' ability to contextualise their own work within historical and contemporary writing trends

Awards

On successful completion of the course, students will be awarded a BA (Hons) Literary Studies with Creative Writing. Students who leave the course early may be eligible for a DipHE Literary Studies with Creative Writing on successful completion of 240 credits including all mandatory modules at levels 4 and 5, or a CertHE Literary Studies with Creative Writing on successful completion of 120 credits including all mandatory modules at level 4.

Course Delivery

The course is delivered at East Coast College. Students studying full-time on BA(Hons) Literary Studies with Creative Writing are likely to have approximately 216 contact hours for level 4 (9 hours per week), 270 contact hours (11 hours per week) for level 5 and approx. 195 contact hours (8 hours per week) for level 6. The contact hours will be a mix of lecture, seminar, practical activity, group work and workshops. Students should also expect to undertake 9-12 hours per week of tutor-set learning, a mix of reading, use of the online learning environment, Professional experience will be gained through case studies, commissions etc. and will be managed as would be a professional working environment. Students will normally be expected to undertake 30 hours of independent study in an average week, but should be prepared for this to vary based on assignment deadlines and class exercises. The ratio of contact hours to independent study hours will vary as students move through the course, with level 6 requiring the most independent input.

Course Assessment

A variety of assessments will be used on the course to enable students to experience and adapt to different assessment styles. The assessment methods used will be appropriate to assess each module's intended learning outcomes. Assessment on the course overall will be approximately 75% coursework (including essays, reports, presentations, group work, reflective learning journals and research projects) and 25% practical assessments.

Course Team

The academic staff delivering this course are drawn from a team that includes teaching specialists and current practitioners. All staff are qualified in their subjects with their own specialist knowledge to contribute.

Course Costs

Students undertaking BA(Hons) Literary Studies with Creative Writing will be charged tuition fees as detailed below.
